CANADIAN COUNCIL ON SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

The CCSD achieved some important accomplishments in 2004/05 in the midst of political volatility and uncertainty.

We continued to meet challenges and seize opportunities by building on our core strengths:

- producing rigorous, reliable and relevant research, valued by our partners and clients;
- creating information tools that enable anyone – from politicians and bureaucrats, to frontline workers and community activists – to develop comprehensive plans to address issues with innovation and pragmatism;
- fostering coalitions and partnerships to provide a strong voice for an inspired social policy agenda to compete with other policy agendas;
- developing media strategies to recognize social investments as vital pillars in building a strong Canada in the 21st Century, rather than as luxuries for another time.

Some of the highlights of our activities over the year included the following:

- The successful release of *Funding Matters*, the first in-depth study of Canada's voluntary and nonprofit sector, was followed by an equally well-received series of workshops and seminars across the country which engaged community organizations in a dialogue around funding issues;
- Child Care for a Change! Shaping the 21st Century, CCSD's national conference on child care was a timely intervention on an issue of paramount importance to social development. Over three days, 650 participants worked on the politics, policies, and priorities for childcare, joined by Social Development Minister Ken Dryden and Manitoba Premier Gary Doer.
- The CCSD continued to be a strong advocate for discussions among Canadians about the importance of the Canada Social Transfer (CST). A major speech by Roy Romanow helped to launch this initiative, and throughout the year, meetings were held with CCSD members and friends in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Ontario, and Alberta.

In 2005/06, the CCSD will continue to build on its strengths.

This fall, we will publish the 7th edition of *The Progress of Canada's Children*. Since its inception in 1996, *Progress* has become a valued and comprehensive source of key indicators on how children and youth are faring in Canada. Once again, *Progress* will track social and economic indicators in a number of areas affecting the lives of Canadian children and highlight implications for public policy.

We will also continue our longstanding focus on poverty and social inclusion with the second edition of *Urban Poverty in Canada: A Statistical Profile*, a report which examines and compares poverty in Canada's major cities using data from the 2001 Census.

CCSD will also continue to promote a pan-Canadian dialogue on the need for accountability and new investments in social programs, and for improvements in the design of Canada's social infrastructure.

Our leadership role in social development and our commitment to developing strategies and tools to advance a progressive social vision for the 21st Century will be reflected in a series of papers on a new social architecture for Canada. We will continue to work with our members and partners in communities across the country to develop and debate a shared vision for the future of Canada's social programs as a core element of the Canada we want.

Both the Board and staff of the CCSD are deeply committed to this work. We would like to thank our members, clients and partners for the support and collaboration which makes our work possible.

CCSD ACTIVITIES

The program activities of the CCSD fall into four main categories:

- **RESEARCH**
- **POLICY INITIATIVES**
- **PUBLIC AFFAIRS**
- **MEMBERSHIP**

RESEARCH

The focus of the CCSD's research work in 2004/2005 covered several broad areas:

- the well-being of Canadian children and families;
- economic and social security;
- measuring social well-being;
- diversity and inclusion;
- research on the nonprofit/voluntary sector and its contribution to social development.

Many research projects within these areas were undertaken over the year. Among them were the following:

Children & Youth

- Completion of a detailed evaluation of *The Progress of Canada's Children* series. Research is well underway for a new edition, to be published in the fall of 2005.
- Analysis of child poverty trends in Canada, in partnership with Campaign 2000.
- Continued consulting work with the Annie E. Casey Foundation on the development of a trilateral comparative report on indicators of well-being among children in North America. Expert consultations and several planning meetings have been held throughout the year. The first report of the series is due in Fall 2005.
- Completed many different data requests, such as one from the BC government for information in their provincial report on children.

Poverty/ Inequality

- Detailed analysis of data from the 2001 Census continues, for publication in a major report on urban poverty in Canada's largest cities and municipalities, scheduled for release early in 2006.
- Preparations have begun for a report on poverty in the City of Ottawa, for the United Way of Ottawa-Carleton.

Voluntary Sector

- Numerous workshops and speaking engagements were held with community-based, national and international groups to disseminate the Council's *Funding Matters* report and discuss voluntary sector issues raised in it. New focus is on next steps to build a campaign for funding reform in the sector

- Provided research and data analysis of patterns of giving, volunteering and participating, for publication in a report entitled *Making Connections: Social and Civic Engagement among Canadian Immigrants*, for the Department of Canadian Heritage.

Disability

- Produced four new *Disability Research Information Sheets* (Nos. 17-20), in both print and electronic formats, for distribution to a wide range of individuals and groups. Using data from the 2001 PALS, WES and Census surveys, this series focused on requirements for supports and services, employment issues, disability combinations, and medication and health patterns. A proposal to continue production of these *Information Sheets* has been submitted.
- Analyzed the needs for and gaps in support programs and services for people with disabilities, in a report to a federal/ provincial/ territorial committee examining federal programs in this area for the Office for Disability Issues (ODI).
- Also participated with ODI in the development of an external survey and analysis of the Council's disability research program and our information products.
- Helped organize a National Safety Symposium with the Canadian Association of Independent Living Centres, and participated in a CAILC forum to celebrate International Day of Disabled Persons.

Cultural Diversity

- Produced the first of two electronic Bulletins to facilitate collaboration among a network of individuals and groups interested in issues around partner violence in immigrant communities in Canada.
- Continued work with Heritage Canada reviewing research reports focused on Canada's different ethnic communities.
- Launching a new project on the risk of homelessness among immigrant and refugee women.

Literacy

- Ongoing research on a workplace literacy project. Initial literature review and advisory meeting have been completed. Currently preparing a detailed analysis of workplace literacy policies and programs, as well as case studies through key informant interviews in four

provinces and briefer sketches of policies and programs in the remaining provinces and territories.

- Writing an op-ed piece with the Movement for Canadian Literacy in response to the release of the international component of Statistics Canada's Adult Literacy and Lifeskills survey, which detailed the high proportion (over 40%) of Canadians who have low literacy skills.

Well-being

- Participated in the development of a new Canadian index of well-being, sponsored by the Atkinson Foundation.

POLICY INITIATIVES

- Completed production of two discussion papers in a new series on social architecture for Canada. The latest papers – *Postponed Adulthood: Dealing with the New Economic Inequality*, by John Myles, Canada Research Chair at the University of Toronto and Statistics Canada, and *The World We Have*, by CCSD Vice President of Research, Katherine Scott – will be officially launched at the Canadian Social Welfare Policy Conference in Fredericton in June 2005.
- The first paper in this social architecture series – *What Kind of Canada?* – was released in the Fall 2004 and called for a national debate on the Canada Social Transfer. All papers are available on the CCSD's website.
- The Community Social Data Strategy (CSDS), in partnership with Statistics Canada, continued to foster community-based consortia across Canada to increase community access to data and help develop research and policy capacities within those communities.
- Participation in many coalitions and policy initiatives, including the following: the National Children's Alliance; the Voluntary Sector Forum; Alternative Federal Budget; Campaign 2000; and International Council on Social Welfare.
- Also participated in a Task Force and Working Group on Modernizing Income Security for Working-Age Adults, sponsored by St. Christopher House and the Toronto Summit Alliance. CCSD prepared data on spending profiles of the working-poor.

PUBLIC AFFAIRS

Child Care: In November 2004, the CCSD sponsored the first child care policy conference held in Canada in over 20 years. More than 650 activists, researchers, policy makers

and politicians attended "Child Care for a Change." It helped shaped strategy in the campaign for a national child care and early learning program, and it brought Social Development Minister Ken Dryden face-to-face with advocates, researchers and parents. Delegates also heard an inspirational speech from UN Special Envoy and former Deputy Executive Director of UNICEF Stephen Lewis. The impact of this conference continues to be felt and the conference proceedings have been posted on the CCSD website.

Social Transfer: The former Royal Commissioner on Health, Roy Romanow, launched the CCSD's work on the Social Transfer with a speech at the National Arts Centre in June. He clearly advocated the Council's position that investments in Canada's social programs need a close examination and that a overhaul would not only benefit Canada's marginalized populations, it would also have a positive economic impact on our health care spending. Romanow's speech is available on the CCSD website.

Crime Prevention: The CCSD has created a useful on-line tool with information on how social development initiatives benefit Canadians, particularly in the area of crime prevention. The Crime Prevention Through Social Development subsite is a thorough collection of research, statistics, general information, community stories, and additional links to ongoing work in this field.

Internet Activity: The CCSD hosted more than half a million visitors to the website in 2004/05. As well, 500 more people subscribed to our e-mail Newsflash list, bringing the total to 4,200. This year, we created a hot new subsite on crime prevention through social development, and it is receiving positive reviews from the field.

A key plan for website development in 2005/06 is to redesign and expand the very popular "Free Statistics" portion of the site. Another area targeted for a major redesign in the coming year is the CCSD Members' Lounge.

MEMBERSHIP, Fundraising and Engaging Canadians

We are very pleased to report that membership revenues held steady this year as we achieved 94% of our forecast budget, and we exceeded our fundraising targets – by over \$2,000. More than 5,000 individuals and organizations were actively engaged in the Council's work and issues over the year. Members, subscribers and friends of the CCSD come from all regions of Canada and around the world, with approximately 62% in individual memberships and 38% in organizational memberships.

Over the last year, the CCSD continued to meet with and work with members across the country. We hosted events for CCSD members and friends in Halifax, Saint John, Ottawa and Calgary, focussed on Canada's Social Transfer initiative – through which we endeavour to stimulate a national dialogue on the future of our social programs. Another noteworthy event hosted by the CCSD this year was the national child care conference, the first in over 20 years. Over 600 people attended the Winnipeg conference, including many Council members and supporters. Events such as these provide opportunities for members, CCSD staff and the Board to exchange ideas and insights on regional priorities and directions, and to enrich the national direction with regional perspectives.
